D9 Neighborhood Report

We have had an unusually high number of shooting incidents this summer in Clifton and Metro Council District 9. Council District 9 is located in LMPD's 5th Police Division, which also includes Metro Council District 8 and parts of Metro Council District 4. After a particularly violent week in early August, Councilman Reno-Weber (8th District Council) and I, co-hosted a public event on Sunday, August 6, to discuss the most recent events at Frankfort Avenue and New Main Street and Bardstown Road and Bonnycastle Avenue.



We were joined at the event by Major Jason Grissom – Commander of LMPD's 5th Division, Brad Silveria -Administrator for the Metro Alcohol Beverage Control, Paul Callanan - Director of the Office for Safe and Health Neighborhoods, and Michael Bogan - the Director of the Metro Group Violence Intervention program. This event was announced on a Thursday and by Sunday afternoon about 500 concerned citizens showed up at the meeting.

A couple of important things came out of the meeting:

- 1) We discussed at length the many policies and programs, particularly related to youth engagement, Metro Government was able to fully fund in the recently passed fiscal year 2024 annual Metro Budget. This community investment occurred after a number of years of the underfunding of programs that support after school and summer youth activities and promote youth civic engagement. There was a particularly glaring cut to these programs in FY 2019, when severe Metro Government budget shortfalls were the order of the day. We also discussed how the rising numbers of disengaged youth in Metro Louisville and other cities is directly correlated to the high violent crime numbers we are experiencing now. So, we feel good about our longterm investment in reducing crime through these programs, but it will take some time to bring those youth disengagement numbers back down to healthy levels and see measurable progress.
- 2) In the short term, a couple of things need to happen to address the urgent situation we are facing today. We need to continue to rebuild the number of LMPD officers in the force so we can return to a more proactive community policing strategy that prevents crime rather than being forced to be entirely reactionary; we need to continue to rebuild the faith and trust between the community and LMPD through community engagement strategies and increased transparency; we need to get our officers out of their cars and embrace a policing model that utilizes foot patrols, bikes, ATVs, golf carts, horses, anything that promotes interaction between our officers and the community.
- 3) And finally, ABC announced at the meeting a change to the enforcement policy of the Metro noise ordinance and have committed to dialing back the general intensity at local establishments that serve alcohol, in an attempt to reduce noise, rowdy behavior and potentially crime. This tighter enforcement will occur primarily during late night hours when many people have already gone to bed with the intention of keeping a lid on rowdy behavior. We understand that we have a limited number of tools in our toolbox to reduce the number of guns in our neighborhoods, so hopefully, by literally turning down the volume at these establishments, we will see a reduction in crime and violence.

On a more positive note, in the last couple of weeks we have installed a new EV charging station at the public parking lot at the corner of Frankfort Avenue and Keats. This was a joint project between Evolve KY, a local non-profit that promotes EV vehicle adoption and charging stations, the Sierra Club of Kentucky, and your Metro Council District 9 office. The charging station is free and open to the public on a first come, first serve basis.

Metro's Louvelo bike stands were installed at Frankfort & Pope and on New Main during the week of May 30-June 2. The bikes to rent were installed the week of June 19.

LouVelo is owned by the city, which has contracted with CycleHop, a leading operator of major municipal bike share programs throughout North America, to run the program. The bicycles and station equipment are provided by PBSC, North America's largest provider of bike share equipment.

The 3 bike rental plans are: \$4.95 for 30 minutes, \$25 per month/ unlimited 60 minute rides, \$25 for 300 minutes to use as you like. Once signed up, you can easily check out a bike through a station, kiosk, a smart phone or with their membership card and return it to any of the 39+ stations within the system. Returning is as simple as parking the bike in the dock.

If you are struggling to pay for your prescriptions, the Kentucky Prescription Assistance Program, 275 East Main St., HS2W-B, Frankfort, KY, may be able to help. Call the Kentucky Prescription Assistance Program (KPAP) Hotline at 1-800-633-8100, available from 8 am. to 4 pm. Monday through Friday.

The program uses high tech – high touch technology to utilize and coordinate existing assistance programs offered by prescription drug companies, reducing paperwork and streamlining the process. The prescriber is asked to sign the completed form(s) at no charge. A number of major pharmaceutical companies provide some type of patient assistance

programs to assist with the cost of medication. KPAP works with the major drug companies to significantly lower the cost of most expensive prescription medications. Eligibility for the program is based on income guidelines set by each individual drug manufacturer. Even senior citizens in the Medicare "donut hole" may be eligible.
