## **Clifton Community Council Board Elections and Public Meeting**

The Clifton Community Council will hold its Annual Public Meeting and Board Elections on September 16. Four current board members are up for re-election: Bill Wright, Pam Vetter, Emily Boone, and Joey Couch. There is one vacancy. To be eligible to vote one must be a Clifton resident, business or property owner, and be a paid dues member (\$10 per person per year).

Shawn Reilly, TARC Marketing Coordinator, will also speak on TARC 2025: Moving Forward Together, a year-long initiative working directly with the community to develop strategies for an updated TARC transit network. The goal is to better meet the region’s needs and priorities within the funding TARC expects to receive over the next 5-10 years. All meetings are open to the public, and we enthusiastically invite everyone to attend. Clifton Community Council Board of Directors meetings are held on Zoom at 6 pm on the 2nd Tuesday of each month. Land Use and Preservation Committee meetings are held on Zoom at 6 pm on the first Tuesday of each month.

## D9 Neighborhood Report

I thought it might be a good time to reflect on the last 20 months and to take stock of a few of the things we have accomplished together in the 9th District. I came into office wanting to focus on improving public infrastructure and on that front, we have all benefitted by the timing of some significant transportation projects that were in the pipeline long before I became your Councilman.

- Very early on, we spent a considerable amount of time discussing the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet's (KYTC) plan to resurface and restripe Frankfort Avenue with the goal of slowing down

traffic and improving safety for both automobiles and pedestrians. While we have significant work left to do, particularly in the area of improving pedestrian mobility and safety, I am proud of the fact that we were able to discuss the merits of the "right-sizing" project in a respectful manner and end up with a plan that achieved broad consensus. We were also able to complete what was a complex, primarily overnight construction program, with as little inconvenience as possible.

- At around the same time we were able to partner with Evolve Kentucky and the Sierra Club of Kentucky to install a new EV charging station in the Metro-owned parking lot at Frankfort Avenue and Keats. While it is still a modest number, we now have 6 free EV charging ports available for drivers along Frankfort Avenue in Clifton and Crescent Hill. Two each at the Irish Rover, Crescent Hill Public Library, and the public parking lot mentioned above.

- Earlier this summer, the CSX Railroad Company finally implemented its long awaited "at grade" crossing improvement project from New Main Street out to St. Matthews. These crossings had been in terrible disrepair for years, and despite what was a very difficult few weeks of street closings, logistics and constituent communications, we now have railroad crossings that are safer for cars, bicycles, pedestrians, and wheelchairs.

- In the past few weeks KYTC finally broke ground on and completed the resurfacing and restriping of Brownsboro Road

from Mellwood Avenue to Chenoweth Lane. While there have been some difficulties with traffic congestion in the area near Chenoweth Elementary School, that traffic has primarily been related to the increased student enrollment and more car riders at the school. Through the joint efforts of JCPS, KYTC, Metro Public Works and our office, we are making incremental progress on both morning and afternoon drive times and I am confident we can continue to improve the situation. Otherwise, I believe the rightsizing has been a tremendous success.

- In the next few weeks we will see the completion of a new section of sidewalk on Bickel Road between S. Ewing Avenue nearly to the intersection of S. Jane Street. This new sidewalk required, among other things, a public easement agreement with property owners and makes our neighborhoods that much more connected.

We have quite a few more infrastructure improvements currently in the pipeline including the repair and or replacement of almost \$150,000 worth of sidewalks in the 9th district and numerous sets of driver feedback speed signs and speedhumps aimed at slowing traffic and two-way street transitions.

Indeed the most important lesson I have learned from my short time in office is that government and public service are primarily about coalition and consensus building, facilitating a safe platform for stakeholder communications, and the management of people and expectations. That is not to say there is no room for visionaries

in this role or that cutting edge ideas aren't welcome, but the meat and potatoes of the job is simply improving people's lives incrementally by focusing on the simple task at hand.

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## Preparing for a Busy Election Season

### Election 2024 Days:

- Early voting days are Thursday, October 31, Friday, November 1, and Saturday, November 2.
- General Election Day is Tuesday, November 5, 2024, from 6:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m.
- Check out the Jefferson County Clerk Election Center and the Kentucky Secretary of State websites for your voting questions.

**Are you ready to vote?** Since 1920, the League of Women Voters of Louisville (LWVL) has been conducting informational meetings, election forums, and voting registration. This year is no different. The League is a non-partisan organization that promotes the informed and active participation of citizens in government.

**Women's Equality Day.** Saturday, August 24, from 10:00 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. at Central High School, 1130 W. Chestnut in Louisville. Women's Equality Day celebrates the passage of the 19th Amendment and women's right to vote in 1920, the same year the LWVL was established. This year's event highlights the importance of voting and women's participation. It will feature live performances, a poetry reading by Hannah

Drake, and a panel addressing the importance of voting and women's rights. This free event is open to the public; childcare and snacks provided. Scan to register for the event.

**Democracy in Action Meetings.** These meetings are open to the public and held at Lang House, 115 S. Ewing Ave. from 5:30 - 7:30 p.m. September 16. The LWVL Observer Corps will sponsor a Democracy in Action Forum, Your Voice—Your Vote, on the media's role in keeping people informed and countering misinformation about elections. The Observer Corps attends local civic meetings such as Metro Council and JCPS Board of Education meetings.

- October 21: The Education Committee will host a

Democracy in Action Forum to discuss the Amendment 2 Ballot Question about allowing state money to go to private schools.

**Voting Forums.** The League will engage in about 21 Candidate Forums throughout Jefferson County. At the time of press, the Voting Forums team was inviting candidates, arranging for debate venues, composing questions, and securing volunteers for the various positions. Volunteers will staff the League desk, keep time, and moderate forums.

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## Clifton Oral History Project

87 years. That's how long Clifton resident Jim Conti has lived in this Louisville neighborhood. His parents built their family home in 1837, where he proudly lives to this day. Conti shares his experiences growing up with the Clifton Community Council's Oral History Project. In the audio recording, Conti shares playing in the quarry, Beargrass Creek, and sledding nearby as a kid. He also mentions a bridge across the creek that once provided easy access to Lexington Road but was washed away in a flood in his early youth.

Another Louisville icon of his day included the C-54 grill, a restaurant made from a Skymaster military transport airplane located at Lexington Road and Grinstead Drive. Louisville

businessman Herman Weist removed the wings, refurbished the interior, and opened the plane as a restaurant. It was returned to flying service in 1951 (UofL Libraries Digital Collections).



Listening to the Oral History Project, you can hear more about Conti's recollections of the neighborhood. The project includes Conti and longtime Clifton residents Dave Creek, Kyle Ellison, and Gary Redmon sharing their stories.

Formerly the James Lees Memorial Presbyterian Church (1901-2015), it was designed by Samuel M. Plato, a nationally-recognized African American Louisville architect. The application for repainting the dome was approved by the Clifton Architectural Review Committee on February 7, 2024.

## Phase One of Bickel Rd Sidewalk Construction

After months of planning, construction began July 23 on the new sidewalk from South Ewing to 2345 Bickel Rd. Metro District 9 Councilman Andrew Owen worked with the Clifton Community Council, Metro Public Works, and Metro Council for the design and March 14, 2024 funding (\$57,000) of the project. Adjoining property owners gave their approval and provided the sidewalk easement. Phase 2 of the project will extend the sidewalk in front of 2301, 2303, and 2305 Bickel and connect to residents in the Crescent Spring condos.



## Mellwood Ave Becomes 2-way Between Frankfort & Brownsboro

Beginning July 22, Metro Public Works Electrical Maintenance (EM) partnered with the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) District 5 on the repaving and reconfiguration of Frankfort Ave., Brownsboro Rd. and Mellwood Ave. The EM team made the needed signal modifications to the Frankfort and Mellwood signals by adding signals to the new westbound approach and the necessary accompanying overhead signage. The new two-way section is on Mellwood Ave. between Frankfort Ave. and Brownsboro Rd.

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## Louisville Visual Art Multi-Sensory Public Art Installation

Lead Artist, Liz Richter, is working actively to complete this momentous and very special project for Clifton despite all the significant delays the project has encountered. Work is scheduled for completion in 2024. Ceramic relief elements which will be attached to the wall after they are fired and glazed are being created off-site.

- By end of June: Clay sculpting completed, all sculpted pieces bisque fired. Audio interpretation rough draft.
- July-August: Reassembling imagery. Glazing sculptural pieces. Glaze firing. Audio interpretation recorded. (LVA)
- September: Installation prep. Website updates, signage ordered and landscaping updated (LVA).
- October: Installation. Rock garden and wind chimes installed. Signage installed, any accessibility issues addressed. Media opportunities and unveiling (LVA).

LVA will work with the Kentucky School for the Blind Charitable Foundation and other key partners, such as New Directions Housing Corporation, to plan and promote a public dedication of the work this fall (specific date to be determined as work progresses). Leading up to that, the project's website will get additional features and there will be ways for the community to be involved via the website in an ongoing, open-ended way after the dedication.

Vision Zero Louisville is Louisville's transportation safety initiative and it is developing a Speed Management Plan to guide its Safer Speeds strategic approach. This may mean modernizing how speed limits are set, developing projects to calm traffic, changing speed limits, and educating drivers. Our community's Speed Management Plan is a multifaceted and balanced effort that includes defining the relationship between speed, speeding, and safety. We are studying current conditions, including crash data, driver trends, and roadway design, as well as evaluating best practices from other Vision Zero cities.

## Call 811 Before You Dig

Within 2-3 days of your call, utility locators will mark your yard with certain colors of paint or flags. Each color represents a different utility. Red is electric. Yellow is gas, oil, or steam. Orange is telephone or cable TV. Blue is water. Green is sewer. It is best to "white line" or mark the area of the project where digging will occur with white paint. This helps the locator focus solely on the area where digging will occur, saving them time on-site and helps ensure that the entire area of excavation is located properly. The utility companies will let you know if there are no underground lines in the area. This is a free service and the work is performed at no cost to you.



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## Clifton is a Preservation District

Prior approval by Louisville Metro Landmarks is required before new construction or changes to exterior: doors, windows, siding, additions, porches, storefront, garages, fences, hand rails, roofs, chimneys, solar panels, retaining walls, shutters, sidewalks, driveways, decks, patios, signs, tree removal, limestone curbs/walls, brick alleys/streets, any demolition, or any other exterior change.
