D9 Neighborhood Report

I want to take this opportunity to discuss in more detail a couple of issues that have occupied a significant amount of my time since I was sworn in.

First, we have experienced a number of violent crimes in our neighborhoods and I have been in frequent contact with LMPD to encourage additional patrols and to receive updates about where each of the investigations stand. I can't discuss ongoing investigations, but I do feel good about the progress LMPD is making in each case.

One of the first things I did after I was sworn in, was to schedule a standing, monthly, in-person, meeting with Major Grissom, head of the 5th Division of LMPD. I did this for two reasons; 1) because I want Major Grissom to know that he has my full support and 2) to make sure Major Grissom and I have a good personal relationship with an excellent line of communication in place. I want to know what is occurring on the ground in the 9th district, on a daily basis, if need be, and what preventative measures are in place to discourage additional crime.

I also recently met with interim LMPD Chief Villaroel, to discuss the steps we are taking as a city to hire and train more officers and implement proven, effective, crime prevention strategies. I really enjoyed my time with the chief and was very impressed with her disposition, background and experience. After our conversation, I do feel like we are making progress, and, once the US Department of Justice report is released with additional recommendations, we will be positioned to both improve accountability within the force and reduce the overall rate of crime and violence in our community.

Finally, improving the relationship between the officers and the community is absolutely critical to making our community safer. I believe getting officers out of their patrol cars and interacting with the community is the first step toward improving this relationship. I will certainly prioritize this approach as a member of the public safety committee. To encourage this approach, I will support additional foot patrols, bike patrols, horse patrols, anything that gets the police out of their cruisers and interacting with the community.

The second issue I want to discuss is the Frankfort Avenue restriping plan. The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) will be resurfacing the entire length of Frankfort Avenue from Mellwood Avenue to Shelbyville Road this spring. KYTC recently released a draft design plan for how the street will be striped after the resurfacing is completed. Frankfort Avenue west of Stilz Avenue will be striped the same way it is today. Frankfort Avenue east of Stilz is still being discussed, but the temporary striping that was done after the Water Company project was completed last fall pretty accurately reflects the draft striping plan (a link to that draft plan is included below).

Over the past few weeks, many of us within and outside of government have been in frequent conversation about KYTC's design proposal, to try to determine what the best design for Frankfort Avenue looks like going forward.

First, I want to make it clear that these rightsizing efforts are almost entirely driven, for better and for worse, by the goal of improving automobile, and to a lesser extent, pedestrian safety. At some level, the bike lanes are an afterthought because there is space left over in the roadway once the lanes are narrowed. I think many people think the bike lanes are the tail that is wagging the dog, and that is simply not true. In fact, many of the cyclists in D9 and other neighborhoods have reached out directly to our office to say they are not in favor of the bike lanes as currently designed.

I have included a couple of links below for reference. The first outlines some of the right-sizing projects that have already been implemented in Metro Louisville and the post implementation safety improvements that have resulted. The second is a link to an NPR article that highlights the incredible success Hoboken, New Jersey has had implementing similar traffic calming practices.

Obviously, each street is unique, but in general, reducing accidents and deaths by slowing down cars seems like a worthy endeavor to me.

Arriving at a design that properly balances improved safety, better connectivity between neighborhoods for as many modes of transportation as possible, and parking needs for our small businesses, is the ultimate goal. I can assure you, that we are working hard to arrive at that delicate balance. At the end of the day, Frankfort Avenue is a state road, and KYTC has the final say over what the striping plan looks like. In the meantime, we will continue to advocate for a design that incorporates neighborhood feedback and achieves the goals I mentioned above.

To make meeting with me in person more convenient, I will begin holding office hours at various places around District 9, starting on Wednesday March 8th, from 11:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. I'll be at St. Joe's Children's Home located at 2823 Frankfort Ave. Please stop by with any questions or concerns.

Check your voter registration status: Are you registered?

Has your address or your name changed? • Will you be at least 18 on or before election day? Go online to GOVOTEKY.COM to learn what to do.

You must have a valid ID with your name & photo. Examples:

Driver's License • College ID • Military ID • any ID issued by the U.S., Kentucky, or local government

If you will be at least 18 on or before the general election on November 7, 2023

You will need your Social Security Card, Birth Certificate, and proof of where you live to get a valid ID

If You Have No Driver's License, a free state issued photo ID is available for voting purposes at the regional driver's license office (DMV). You will need a Social Security Card, Birth Certificate, and Proof of Address. If you are living with your parents or guardian, you will need 2 proofs of address.

There are Three Days of Early Voting: Thursday, Friday, and Saturday prior to election.

Absentee Ballot Process: Are you eligible? Absentee ballots are available to voters who meet certain guidelines. Check out <u>GOVOTEKY.COM</u> for answers to your questions. There is also information about becoming a Precinct Worker.





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Louisville Visual Art - Multi-Sensory Public Art Installation



Construction has begun on the Louisville Visual Art multi-sensory public art installation in Banks Commons at the corner of Frankfort and State St. The Clifton-based Kentucky School for the Blind Charitable Foundation provided primary support for the project. Liz Richter, a local muralist and Clifton resident, created a design that features a curved, free-standing wall showing historically significant Clifton buildings and locations. Ceramicist Kristen Falkirk will fabricate the complex ceramic elements.

The project's most innovative aspect is its sensory accessibility to blind and visually impaired people via the surface texture of the mosaic, audio description, braille signage, and supplementary online content. The American Printing House for the Blind, the Clifton Community Council, GBBN Architects, and New Directions Housing Corporation, provided key material and in-kind support to supplement funding from the National Endowment for the Arts, South Arts, Metro EAF & NDF, and Louisville Fund for the Arts.
