Help Improve Clifton

My office receives a lot of phone calls and emails regarding infrastructure issues in the District. In this edition I'd like to share information on how to proactively report issues to Metro. I do my best to report everything I see, but there's no way I'm able to proactively see every broken light, pothole, piece of graffiti, and other issue in our district. We need your help in reporting things like this so that we can take care of them. Only with your help can our community reach its full potential.

Do you notice a streetlight out or malfunctioning? Did you know that you can report those issues online 24/7 through LG&E? Please use the following link, <https://lge-ku.com/outages/report/streetlight>. LG&E will make every effort to repair the light within 48 hours of the request. Some repairs may take longer due to unforeseen circumstances, such as the nature of the repair or weather-related events. Please do not hesitate to contact LG&E again if the repairs are not made within seven (7) days. If you need immediate assistance, or to report a down wire or gas leak/odor, contact LG&E at 502-589-1444 or 800-331-7370.

Is there a pothole in your street or alley? You can report that issue directly to Metro311. Please make note of a nearby address or intersection to help Metro Public Works locate the pothole. You can report the issue by creating a service request, downloading the Metro311 Mobile App, calling 574-5000 during normal business hours, or sending an email to metro.311@louisvilleky.gov. For more information on the process, please visit <https://louisvilleky.gov/government/metro311/making-service-request>.

Did you know the D9 office pays for graffiti removal from the right-of-way in the District? The next time you notice graffiti on street signs, overpasses, utility boxes, etc., you can email graffitibuster@gmail.com with the location. Include a photo if you have it to help them identify the location. If the graffiti is on private property, it's the property owner's responsibility to have it removed. You can contact Metro311 to report the issue.

While out walking in the District, have you noticed sidewalk tripping hazards or cracked sections? If so, please report them to Metro311. Metro Public Works will rate the sidewalk between 1 – 5 based on the tripping hazard. The sidewalk section will then be placed on the repair list for when funding is available.

As with any request you send through Metro311, please write down the SR number they provide to you. We can use that SR number to track down your original request. If the issue you report is not fixed in a reasonable time, or you need assistance in making a report, you can contact my office by email at bill.hollander@louisvilleky.gov or kyle.ethridge@louisvilleky.gov or by calling 502-574-1109.

Finally, please don't report the issue multiple times to the system, unless it's been fixed before and needs new attention. Every time you call Metro311 it creates a new request, which is just a duplicate. Those duplicates need to be manually closed out and referred to the original request.

Seeing a problem every day and complaining isn't going to fix it. Will you help be a part of the solution?

What You Should Know About Redistricting (excerpt from www.LWV.org)

Every 10 years, after the collection of the census data, states redraw their state and congressional district lines. These districts determine how communities are represented at the local, state, and federal levels. The spring issue of *The Clifton Quarterly* highlighted the local issues of Redistricting. Here are some things you should know in general about it:

- Redistricting is the process in which new boundaries for representational districts are drawn to determine how communities are represented. These districts are redrawn every 10 years based on census data.
- Redistricting determines who appears on your ballot, where you can vote, and can influence whether your elected officials respond to your needs. Redistricting is how we make sure our voices are represented equally by creating districts that have nearly the same number of people in it. To create districts of equal population, we use the census. One of the first steps for fair maps is to ensure we have an accurate and complete count of the census.
- Redistricting is vulnerable to gerrymandering, the intentional manipulation of the redistricting process by the people in political power to keep or change political power. This can happen in a number of ways, such as by consolidating communities into one district, which gives that community only one representative in the legislature. Or by dividing the community across districts and ensuring that the community is always the minority and less likely to be adequately represented by their representatives. Two common forms of gerrymandering are racial gerrymandering and partisan gerrymandering. **Racial gerrymandering** is the intentional manipulation of the redistricting process to reduce the political power of a certain racial group. Today, we still often see it show up when states draw maps. **Partisan gerrymandering** is when districts are drawn in a way to give an unfair advantage to one political party, group, or incumbent.
- We can curb gerrymandering through increased public input, accountability, and transparent processes. The redistricting process varies from state to state. Some states have independent redistricting commissions that draw maps, while others have their maps drawn by politicians and legislators, and others fall somewhere in between. To ensure that the redistricting process is fair and doesn't lead to racial or partisan gerrymandering, it is necessary to have the opportunity for public input and accountability into the map-drawing process. The League of Women Voters is using a variety of methods to reform the redistricting process in states and increase opportunities for people to have a voice in how their districts are drawn.
- The next redistricting cycle is upon us, and you can get involved through the People Powered Fair Maps™. National, Kentucky, and Louisville Leagues are committed to ensuring that we have fair maps for the next redistricting cycle. For more information, go to www.LWVKY.org or www.Facebook.com/LWVKY.

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VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

United Crescent Hill Ministries is currently in need of volunteers for the following positions. The work of UCHM would not be possible without our support from our volunteers. From combating hunger to enriching the lives of youth, there are many ways to get involved at UCHM. Please apply by visiting our website at <https://www.uchmlouky.org/volunteer/>.

- Food Pantry – Volunteer in our food pantry Monday – Friday 1:00 – 4:00pm, Monday, Wednesday and Thursday, and 1:00 – 6:00pm on Tuesday. Food pantry volunteers assist with stocking and organizing food, assembling food boxes for families, and helping clients with their needs.
- Donation Pick-up – Donation pick-up volunteers transport food donations to and from various partners including the Dare to Care Main Warehouse and Kroger. Schedules for drivers are flexible during the daytime on weekdays. Valid driver's license and reliable transportation needed.
- Front Desk – Volunteers assist with administrative duties such as answering the UCHM phone, fielding client questions, and coordinating communication between clients and food pantry volunteers. Shifts are available from 9am – 1pm and 1pm – 4pm.
- United Learning After-School Program – Volunteers provide homework help and tutoring to students enrolled in the United Learning after-school program as well as assist with enrichment activities. This program follows the JCPS schedule and operates after-school from 3:00pm – 6:00pm. UCHM asks that volunteers commit to at least two hours a week for one academic semester. Virtual tutoring options available.

MSD Sewer Line Rehabilitation Work

Preliminary work has begun to rehabilitate sewer lines and manholes on Saunders Avenue, Bickel Road, Crescent Springs Dr., Ledgeview Park Dr., S. Ewing Ave., and S. Peterson Ave. so MSD can continue to provide safe, clean waterways.

The sewer lines, made of vitrified clay and reinforced concrete, have served the area since the early 1900s. To rehabilitate them, MSD will insert a cured-in-place liner—through existing manholes—eliminating the need for excavation. The liner essentially forms a new pipe inside of the existing one. Construction is scheduled to begin in October and be complete in January 2022. Of course, this schedule is subject to weather conditions.

Payne Street & Clifton Avenue Improvements

The Payne St. and Clifton Ave. improvement project has received the green light to move forward with construction. Included in the work will be a new sidewalk, pavers, curb and gutter, pavement markings, and two marked crosswalks across Clifton Ave. and Payne St. Once the roadway is complete, Metro Public Works will be installing a four-way stop at this intersection.

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
The 132 year old Maxwell-Maloney house was one of the oldest, if not the oldest home remaining in Louisville's Clifton neighborhood in 2002 – an area originally known as Pope's Addition (named after developer Charley D. Pope). When built in 1871, the home was the first in that area of Frankfort Avenue, then on the fringe of Louisville's established neighborhoods and surrounded only by farm fields. The Maxwell's nearest neighbors were the landmark Kentucky School for the Blind building (now demolished) and Linden Hill, a historic home still standing at the foot of Frankfort Avenue near Story Avenue in the Butchertown neighborhood.

The home was built by Dr. Joseph Maxwell and his wife Jane "Jennie" Maxwell on land that Mrs. Maxwell's mother, Charlotte Baker had bought in the fall of 1870. The Maxwell's had seven children, four of whom survived to adulthood – George S., Thomas M., Lillian, and Harriet. Dr. Maxwell was a physician and a professor at the University of Louisville. They moved to the area from their home on the corner of 15th and Market Streets. Dr. Maxwell also maintained an office on 7th Street between Main and Market.

Lillian and Harriet were spinsters and continued to live in the house after the deaths of their parents, both of whom had died by 1903. Lily died in 1915, leaving the house to her sister who operated a taxidermy business from the front parlor where her father had seen patients for more than 30 years. The Maxwell family plot is in Louisville's Eastern Cemetery.

Upon Harriet's death in 1951, the home was sold to Elinor Fromang Maloney, who added for the first time plumbing, gas, and electric utilities. The house became not only home for her and her two sons, Joe and Pat, but in the first few years, the Hilltop House Antiques Shop. Mrs. Maloney added an off street parking area in the rear of the house and removed several outbuildings, including dilapidated stables, an outhouse, and a frame kitchen attached to the rear of the house.

In the fall of 2002, an offer was made to purchase the house by Mitch Osborne, owner of the Louisville Inn across the street, but was rejected by one of the heirs. The house was subsequently sold to Jimmy Conti, owner of the old Hilltop Theater where he operated a novelty business. Conti's plans are somewhat fluid, but demolition of both 1755 and the adjacent home have been discussed for parking. After a structural engineer determined the house had multiple structural issues and renovation would be too costly, the residence was demolished in 2003.

Prior approval by Metro Landmarks is required before new construction or changes to: exterior doors, windows, siding, additions, porches, storefront, garages, fences, hand rails, roofs, retaining walls, shutters, sidewalks, driveways, decks, patios, signs, tree removal, limestone curbs/walls, brick alleys/streets, any demolition, or any other exterior change. The Metro Landmarks staff are available to assist you and answer any questions you may have by calling 502-574-6230.



Speed Limits

The speed limit on Frankfort Ave. and Brownsboro Rd., which are state roads, is 35 mph. All other streets in the neighborhood are considered city streets in residential areas where the speed limit is 25 mph. Drivers should also be aware of the many visually-impaired and disabled citizens living or working in the neighborhood and take caution at intersections. Parking on sidewalks or obstructing pedestrian passage on sidewalks is not permitted.
