

Farewell – and Thank You!

This is my last column as the Metro Councilmember for District 9, which includes the Clifton neighborhood. I chose not to run for reelection and my successor will take office on January 2.

Serving you for the last eight years has been the honor of my professional life. You've let us know when we missed picking up your garbage, yard waste or recycling, or when there is a pothole that isn't getting filled, and we've tried to be responsive. Local government services aren't the most exciting, but no one thinks much of any government if it doesn't deliver the basics.

Seeing things that need improvement and trying to make them happen has been very rewarding. I'll never forget walking on South Ewing with blind constituents to see how they were forced to walk in the street to get to Frankfort Avenue - and using your tax dollars to build a sidewalk there. I smile every time I'm at Payne and South Ewing and see that sidewalk in use. I feel the same way when I'm on Jane Street and see people using the new sidewalk to get to or from Kroger, another place where people formerly walked in the street.

Some things we've worked on will see action in the future. Bingham Park is a real gem on Coral Avenue and Brownsboro Road, but we haven't invested in it in years. That will change soon, and I can't wait to make the new path through it part of my regular long walks.

While representing District 9, I've also tried to move the entire community forward in critical areas. When I was elected, zero local dollars had been forwarded to the Affordable Housing Trust Fund for housing. In the last eight years, we've appropriated over \$97 Million for the trust fund and an additional \$19 Million to a similar program called Louisville CARES. That's a total of \$116 Million and it's making a difference for thousands of Louisville residents.

LMPD has been a major focus of the community and Metro Council in recent years. I began speaking about the need for an independent Inspector General for our police department several years ago. Sponsoring the creation of that office and a meaningful Civilian Review and Accountability Board is work that I hope will help improve LMPD, heal the community and enhance public safety.

I'm out of space – and almost out of time. Thank you for allowing me the honor of serving the great neighborhood of Clifton!

Everyone's Vote Counts!

The fall was a very busy time for League of Women Voters of Louisville volunteer members! In September, the League Election Committee members began contacting all Louisville Metro, Jefferson County, State Legislature, and Judicial candidates serving Louisville Metro, to invite them to participate in Candidate Forums. Dates and times were set, sites secured for the forums throughout the city, specific scripts written for each forum, League volunteers secured to host each forum, and volunteers from Clifton Community Council and other neighborhood organizations helped plan events and develop questions. This focus on neighborhoods made the forums relevant to the communities the candidates aim to serve. The Urban League, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, the Louisville Bar Association, and other community groups became major partners with the League during the planning stage and during the Forums.

We gratefully thank all volunteers involved!

In all, 12 Candidate Forums were held in September and October in Central High School, Lang House, libraries (Northeast Regional, Iroquois, Southwest Regional, and South Central Regional), the Louisville Bar Association Center, Norton Healthcare Sports & Learning Center, and WLKY-TV studios. Furthermore, **on Friday, November 4, 2022, WLKY-TV, along with the League, will host a live debate at 12:30 p.m., covering the U.S. 3rd Congressional District between Stuart Ray and Morgan McGarvey.** This debate will replay on **Saturday, November 5**, from 8:00-9:00 p.m.

So, why does the League do all this work? We believe that an informed citizenry can make wise decisions during elections. We urge you to check out the numerous live streams and write-ups in the Courier Journal, radio, and television websites. Go online to GoVoteKY.com to print out the sample ballot. Amendment 1 is quite lengthy! Study your sample ballot, fill it out, and take it with you as a guide when you **go to vote on November 8.**

There are **two Constitutional Amendments** on the ballot. **After careful research and discussion, the League recommends**

Amendment 1: Vote No to keep the current legislation in place. The Legislature will hold regular sessions for 60 days in even-numbered years and 30 days in odd-numbered years. The Governor will continue to call any special sessions and define the agenda. A Yes Vote will mean that Legislators will be able to meet more often and change Kentucky law more often. For the first time, the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate will be able to call special legislative sessions. Special sessions may add up to 12 days per year to the legislative calendar, costing taxpayers approximately \$780,000, and legislators may give themselves a pay raise, making it effective during their session.

Amendment 2: Vote No to oppose the change in Kentucky Constitution. If Amendment 2 is defeated, the Kentucky Constitution will be unchanged, and those affected by state laws restricting abortion will be able to argue in state court that those laws violate their state constitutional rights. A Yes Vote supports the change. State lawmakers will be free to pass laws restricting abortion, and those affected by those laws will not be able to ask state courts to overturn those laws as violations of their state constitutional rights. **THE LEAGUE POSITION IS TO VOTE NO ON AMENDMENT 2.**

W. Harold Frantz Christmas Cards

Below are excerpts from the article written by Metro columnist, Jim Adams, printed in *The Courier-Journal* on Tuesday, December 14, 1993.

An artistic Christmas ritual, done with a religious devotion, too. It is all the work of W. Harold Frantz. In 1883, when he was 4, his parents – George W and Mary M. – bought a grand, three-story brick home at Sycamore and Clifton avenues.

Frantz, who was one of six children, would never marry, and in fact would spend the remainder of his Victorian life in that very house. When *The Louisville Times* tracked him down in 1955, he was a slender man still reading by the flame of gaslight fixtures. It became Frantz's tradition to make Christmas cards every year, and not amateurish stuff, either, but cards fine enough to make Hallmark insecure. While Frantz made his living as a draftsman for Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph, at Christmastime he was an artist and a poet.


A flat, white Stewart's box containing 27 of his pencil-and-ink cards came into the possession of the Filson Club in 1988. It was donated by Mrs. B. Irby Moore. The cards were made between 1919 and 1948, and Moore said they fell to her through her aunt Estelle Hays, who was married to one of Frantz's four brothers.

How many of the cards Frantz made each year, or whether he ever sent them, or to whom, or how long he worked on each, or when or why he started making them – that much has been lost. But fortunately it is survived by the cards themselves.

The very first Frantz card in the Filson Club's display bears a portrait of Frantz's mother, and the verse devoted to her. Frantz's cards depict rooms, outbuildings or random scenes from what was his family's wonderful home, which has since been torn down. And through them all, Mary Frantz is the only person who ever appears – in fact, the only one who is ever even mentioned specifically.

Rich in physical detail, all the cards are nevertheless empty, some would say lonely and despairing. Mother herself, always in the same long, dark dress, appears again in 1932 and, finally in 1946. When the *Times* tracked Mr. Frantz down, four years before his death, it reported that he was living in the 20-room house alone. "It is a house of pleasant memories for Frantz" it said.

W. Harold Frantz Christmas Cards were printed in 1994 for the Clifton Community Council. The collection was edited and re-printed with the permission of the Filson Club Historical Society, 1310 S. 3rd St. 40208. Short Term Rentals in Clifton

As of 9/25/22, there are 37 metro licensed short term rentals (Airbnb) within Clifton. 11 of these are host occupied. 8 short term rentals are located in commercial zoned properties on Frankfort Ave. 18 short term rentals require a conditional use permit as they are not the primary residency of the owner. In addition, there are 9 applications pending metro approval. Of these 9, 3 are host occupied, and 6 require a conditional use permit.

In December 2015, Metro Council passed an ordinance regulating the use of short term rentals. The ordinance was amended in 2019. One of the amendments stipulates that -- "The property on which the short term rental(s) is situated shall not be located closer than 600 feet (measured in a straight line from nearest property line to nearest property line) to any property on which another approved short term rental that required a conditional use permit is situated." 600 feet is roughly the length of a city block.

The Louisville Metro website has information regarding short term rental rules, how to register, the application process, maps to locate approved short term rentals, how to report an illegal short term rental, how to report an issue with a short term rental, and helpful links. Go to:

A few things to know:

- All short term rental hosts must annually register each of their rentals with Louisville Metro's Office of Planning & Design Services. The annual registration fee is \$100.
- All hosts must also register with the Louisville Metro Revenue Commission to pay the Bed Tax and Occupational Tax.
- Failure to register a short term rental is equivalent to operating without a permit and will result in enforcement action. A first offense results in a \$125 fine, a second offense results in a \$250 fine, a third offense results in a \$500 fine, and any additional offense results in a \$1,000 fine. Each day may be considered a separate offense.

MSD Senior Citizen Discount

Senior citizens who are age 65 or older and have a gross annual household income of \$35,000 or less may request an application for a 30 percent discount on wastewater charges and the consent decree surcharge.

Emergency Wastewater Rate Assistance Program

Beginning October 1, 2022, the Emergency Wastewater Rate Assistance Program (EWRAP) triples to provide a 30 percent discount on MSD wastewater charges to qualifying low-income customers.



Junk Pick-up Set Out Dates:

2022: Oct 14-16

2023: Feb 24-26 and June 9-11

Large items include: Couch, chair, table, buffet, bed, dresser, box spring, mattress, floor lamp, crib, playhouses, carpet roll, etc. Washers, dryer, stoves, hot water tanks, bicycles, bed frames, etc. (No refrigerators or other items containing or once containing coolant.)

The Clifton neighborhood boundaries are: Brownsboro Rd on the north, Ewing Ave on the east, I-64 on the south, and Mellwood Ave on the west.

Clifton is a Preservation District

Prior approval by Louisville Metro Landmarks is required before new construction or changes to exterior: doors, windows, siding, additions, porches, storefront, garages, fences, hand rails, roofs, chimneys, retaining walls, shutters, sidewalks, driveways, decks, patios, signs, tree removal, limestone curbs/walls, brick alleys/streets, any demolition, or any other exterior change.
